Lauren E. Oberlin, Ph.D., is Assistant Professor of Psychology in Psychiatry, Department of Psychiatry, at Weill Cornell Medicine and is Assistant Attending Psychologist at NewYork-Presbyterian Hospital. Dr. Oberlin specializes in the neuropsychological assessment and therapeutic treatment of middle-aged and older adults. She provides individual therapy for older adults with depression, anxiety and other mood disorders, caregivers of medically ill patients, and adults coping with neurologic or other medical conditions. She obtained her doctoral degree in Clinical Psychology and Biological and Health Psychology from the University of Pittsburgh, and she completed her clinical internship in adult psychology and neuropsychology at New York University Langone Health. She received postdoctoral training at the Weill Cornell Institute of Geriatric Psychiatry. Her research interests include identifying and refining novel treatments for mood disorders in aging and using brain imaging techniques to
