**Lauren E. Oberlin, Ph.D.**, is Assistant Professor of Psychology in Psychiatry, Department of Psychiatry, at Weill Cornell Medicine and is Assistant Attending Psychologist at New York-Presbyterian Hospital. Dr. Oberlin specializes in the neuropsychological assessment and therapeutic treatment of middle-aged and older adults. She provides individual therapy for older adults with depression, anxiety and other mood disorders, caregivers of medically ill patients, and adults coping with neurologic or other medical conditions. She obtained her doctoral degree in Clinical Psychology and Biological and Health Psychology from the University of Pittsburgh, and she completed her clinical internship in adult psychology and neuropsychology at New York University Langone Health. She received postdoctoral training at the Weill Cornell Institute of Geriatric Psychiatry. Her research interests include identifying and refining novel treatments for mood disorders in aging and using brain imaging techniques to evaluate the mechanisms underlying new and promising interventions.



*This presentation will focus on the cognitive and emotional sequelae of Long COVID, including recent research on the profile of clinical symptoms and potential mechanisms of onset. Promising therapeutic interventions and their application in clinical practice will also be discussed, including special considerations for working with individuals experiencing post-acute COVID-19 syndromes.*
